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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Mt. Airy Commuter Station is a small residence and passenger station on the Chestnut Hill, Reading Line. The structure is a 1½ story brick and wood structure. The station is an approximate rectangle with a protruding 2-story rectangular tower on the track side. The lower story is brick with frame details and frame sections on each short end. The upper story is all frame as is the car port and the porched area to the trackside. The total effect is the Victorian age "Stick Style." The building's character is most expressive in its rich and varied steep roof line. Combining hipped, gabled and jerkinhead designs with a double splayed profile to the track-side porch and upper residence windows, the roof offers an aggressive silhouette. The wooden surfaces are richly detailed with a half timbered effect to the upper areas; also with brackets of various sizes and with decorative arch shaped woodwork in open wall areas. Both the heavy brackets of the track porch and the uniquely styled decorative arches are closely related to the individualized Gravers Lane Station, designed by Frank Furness.

The SE section contains a large passenger waiting room with ticket counters under the tower. The interior of this section has been badly graffite-ed and is in shabby condition. The northwest section was the stationmaster's residence and is still occupied.

A small wooden porch area faces the station on the out bound track side and repeats the bracketed design of the larger portico.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Mt. Airy Station, like its near contemporary Graver's Lane Station, identifies a high point in suburban commuter railroad stations and residence. In this small, essentially functional structure, a (still) unknown architect designed with untempered exuberance. Stylistically described as a High Victorian Stick Style type, the station also borrows from the special design types of Frank Furness. The final result is one of the finest unattributed transportation related structures in the Philadelphia area.

Like the Gravers Station, the Mt. Airy station combines a residence and passenger section in an essentially late 19th Century domestic mode, expressing the service aspects of the station with richly detailed porch areas. The solution fits the station properly into a middle class residential neighborhood, echoing the styles and tastes of the early developers of the railroad community.
