DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Logan Furnace Mansion is a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story, 5 bay coursed stone building (46 x 27 feet) with a two story, 3 bay kitchen extension to the rear and also of stone. The mansion has an "L" shape plan. The kitchen wing was the original house and was built 1798-1800 by John Dunlop. The main section to the north was built circa 1818.

The kitchen wing has a three bay facade facing the creek. A large chimney filled the far wall and a stairwell partitioned the house into two large rooms.

The interior of this section has experienced changes in recent years which include the filling in of the kitchen fireplace and the removal of two fireplaces upstairs. The mantle of the dining room fireplace remains intact as do chair-rails on first and second floors. All detailing is of the simplest order, however, feature such as the wainscoating on the first floor still remain. The stairs are central and were probably originally enclosed. The attic reveals tapered 3½ by 3 inch rafters, variously 26-30 inches o.c. and a tin roof nailed to lath. Rafters are joined with square, hand-carved pins and rest directly on the stone walls.

The main house has a symmetrical plan with one room on either side of the central hall. The exterior appearance consists of a five-bay facade in which stones are roughly squared. The main entrance consists of a wide door surmounted by a semicircular lunette. A wide molding surrounds the door, leading to a decorative wooden keystone at the top. Reveals are panelled and the underside of the arch is reeded. The window displays graceful fan tracery.

Nearly all windows at the Logan Furnace site have been replaced; however, original sash sizes were preserved. Window frames on the first floor are embellished with reeding terminating in square blocks at the corners.

The interior finish of the main house has deteriorated with all fireplaces having been removed. The original open-newelled stairway remains.

There are porches on the main facade of the 1818 section and on two sides of the older section. Both porches were added later in the 19th century.

Both sections of the house have basements and are now covered with tin roofing.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In the autumn of 1794, Col. James Dunlop, his son John, and son-in-law, James Harris moved to the Nittany Valley to settle on lands near present-day Bellefonte. The Colonel built the first house in Bellefonte and with Harris laid out the town in 1795. In the same year John Dunlop began building a forge in Bellefonte and also joined with the Patton and Miles firm in the construction of Harmony Forge.

In 1797 Dunlop began the erection of Logan Furnace and had it in operation the following year. It was probably at this time that the present kitchen wing of the house was built. Dunlop had married in 1797; and from the information available, it would appear that the Logan house was the couple's first home.

In 1813 Jacob Thomas met with John Dunlop, and when Dunlop died in 1814, he and Samuel, Jacob, George and Reuben Valentine settled in Centre County. They occupied the Dunlop residence and eventually purchased the Dunlop ironworks. By 1818, the household had expanded sufficiently to add the main section to the older portion of the house.

The ironworks of the Valentines and Thomas prospered and by 1828 was producing as much iron as all the other Centre County furnaces combined. In 1842. Logan furnace discontinued operation and was dismantled. Logan was now too far from resources of charcoal. The Logan Mansion is the remaining evidence of a once-thriving early Centre County industry.
