6. brief description (note unusual features, integrity, environment, threats and associated buildings)  
 Bayard School stands on a small mid-block site in a dense residential portion of Pittsburgh's Lawrenceville neighborhood. The two-story brick building's main facade faces Hatfield Street, from which it is slightly recessed. The facade is awkwardly proportioned--the building may have been built in two stages. A central---

7. history, significance and/or background  
 Bayard School was also know as the Seventh Ward Public School and the Washington Public School, and is sometimes confused with the Washington School which stood nearby on Fortieth Street near Butler Street from 1869-1935. It was formerly part of the Washington Sub-district. Land was assembled for the school in 1840 and 1871, but only the single date of 1874 is obtainable for this building though it may have been constructed in two stages. The school was renamed Bayard School under the -----

entry bay, with a large rounded arch doorway and two second-floor rounded arch windows, is flanked by sections of similar three-bay design but dissimilar dimensions and window spacing. Both sections have segmentally arched windows with projecting brick drip molds, but the remaining original double-hung sash appear to be four-over-four in the left section and two-over-two in the right section. A wood cornice with paired brackets is flattened at the center bay, but follows shallow gables over the flanking sections.

The basement is rubble stone plastered and scored to imitate dressed ashlar, and the entry surround is of composition stone formed to resemble rusticated ashlar. There is a name-stone in each gable end of the facade (Seventh Ward Public School/Washington Public School). An east end entry has a hood supported on heavy consoles. The rear portion of the structure has a cross-gable roof which runs the length of the building. There are two chimneys at the east end and a prominent rooftop pavilion, now an air vent, hovers over the facade.

Both the front and rear of the building have been badly altered with concrete block and metal additions which serve the building's present use as a warehouse. The interior was not accessible for examination, and has likely been significantly altered.

Pittsburgh Board of Public Education after an early landowner. The building was closed in 1938 and sold in 1941.

Bayard School is significant as one of Pittsburgh's oldest school buildings and as an unusual, if somewhat awkward, Italianate design.
