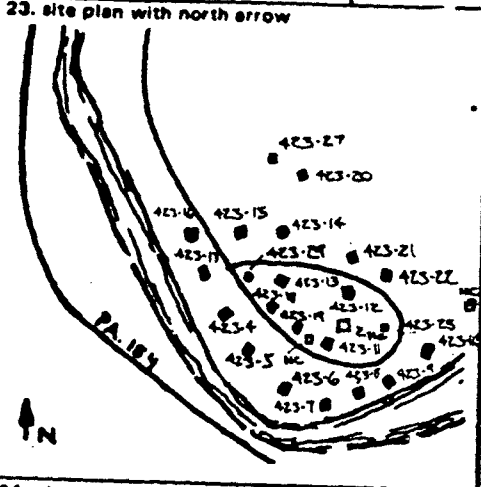

26. brief description (note unusual features, integrity, environment, threats and associated buildings)
 Worlds End State Park is an area of 780 acres in the narrow, S-shaped valley of Loyalsock Creek just south of Forksville, Sullivan County. The park is adjacent to the Wyoming State Forest and is one of the most remote and primitive state parks in Pennsylvania.

27. history, significance and/or background
 CCC Camp S-95 developed Worlds End State Park between May 1933 and late 1941. The park officially opened to the public in 1936.
 Worlds End State Park Family Cabin Historic District appears to meet Criteria A and C for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. It is associated with the Emergency Conservation Work performed by the Civilian Conservation Corps, one of the

A single historic district, encompassing the family cabin area at the park, is proposed for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. The proposed Worlds End State Park Family Cabin Historic District contains twenty-five buildings. Three modern latrines are considered non-contributing resources.

- Cabin No. 1 (423-4) Single room, square-plan log cabin with corner posts and white cement chinking. Pyramidal roof penetrated by a stone chimney at the peak. Inset porch with stone piers.
- Cabin No. 2 (423-5) Single room, rectangular, gable-roofed log cabin with corner posts and white cement chinking. Front wall of cabin, which incorporates a stone fireplace and chimney, is stone. One gable end of roof extended beyond building plan to form inset porch with low stone wall and squared timber roof supports.
- Cabin No. 3 (423-6) Two-room, L-plan, gable-roofed cabin. Side and rear walls clad with wane-edged siding. Front wall, which incorporates a stone fireplace and chimney, is stone. Deep, inset porch, with stone piers and low stone wall, extends beyond front wall of cabin.
- Cabin No. 4 (423-7) Similar to Cabin No. 3.
- Cabin No. 5 (423-8) Similar to Cabin No. 2.
- Cabin No. 6 (423-9) Single room, rectangular, gable-roofed stone cabin. One gable end forms a porch with stone roof supports.
- Cabin No. 7 (423-10) Large, three-room, T-plan log cabin with saddle corners and white cement chinking. Cross-gabled roof. One gable extended to form a porch with stone piers. Stone chimney on opposite gable end. Deeply recessed entry creates a cross pen effect.
- Cabin No. 8 (423-11) Similar to Cabin No. 3.
- Cabin No. 9 (423-12) Similar to Cabin No. 6.

 - Cabin No. 15 (423-18) Similar to Cabin No. 13.
 - Cabin No. 16 (423-19) Similar to Cabin No. 13.
 - Cabin No. 17 (423-20) Similar to Cabin No. 13.
 - Cabin No. 18 (423-21) Large, three-room square cabin with wane-edged siding. Pyramidal roof penetrated by a stone chimney at the peak. Shed-roofed porch with square posts on front facade.
 - Cabin No. 19 (423-22) Three-room, rectangular, gable-roofed cabin with wane-edged siding. Inset porch, with square posts, on one eave side. Stone chimney on one gable end.
 - Latrine (423-25) Rectangular, gable-roofed latrine with wane-edged siding. A standard design. - *contributing*

most important of the federal relief efforts initiated under the New Deal, an exceptionally significant development in the twentieth century history of the United States. These buildings also exemplify the rustic style of architecture espoused by the National Park Service. This style

and philosophy have come to characterize most national and state parks in the United States.

More specifically, Worlds End State Park Family Cabin Historic District is significant in the following areas:

Architecture/Landscape Architecture:

These buildings and structures epitomize the rustic style and philosophy of architecture espoused by the National Park Service. Rustic buildings and structures are designed to blend with the natural environment. They make use of local, natural materials and represent a perceived notion of pioneer American architecture. Buildings are placed on the landscape so as not to detract from the natural environment.

Conservation/Recreation:

These buildings and structures have been used as recreational facilities for approximately fifty years. They represent the results of a massive federal effort to construct and improve outdoor recreational facilities across the United States.

Politics/Government:

These buildings and structures were constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), one of the most important federal relief programs created under Roosevelt's New Deal. They are thus representative of the federal building programs that constituted one of the major developments of the Depression Era. Built on state-owned property, they also represent an unprecedented cooperation between state and federal government.

Social/Humanitarian:

The buildings and structures constructed by the CCC constitute a massive humanitarian program initiated by the federal government during the depths of the Depression. The construction of these buildings and structures employed thousands of jobless young men, many of whom were homeless before they joined the Civilian Conservation Corps.

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Boundary Information

Beginning at a point on the south side of the cabin area access road approximately 1,400 feet from the point at which the road crosses Loyalsock Creek, thence at a right angle to the road in a southwesterly direction approximately 150 feet to the north bank of Loyalsock Creek. Thence upstream along the north bank of Loyalsock Creek approximately 2,000 feet to a point. Thence west approximately 1,000 feet to a point on the road Organized Group Tenting Area access road. Thence in a southwesterly direction approximately 400 feet to the starting point. These boundaries contain all of the resources associated with the Worlds End State Park Family Cabin Historic District.

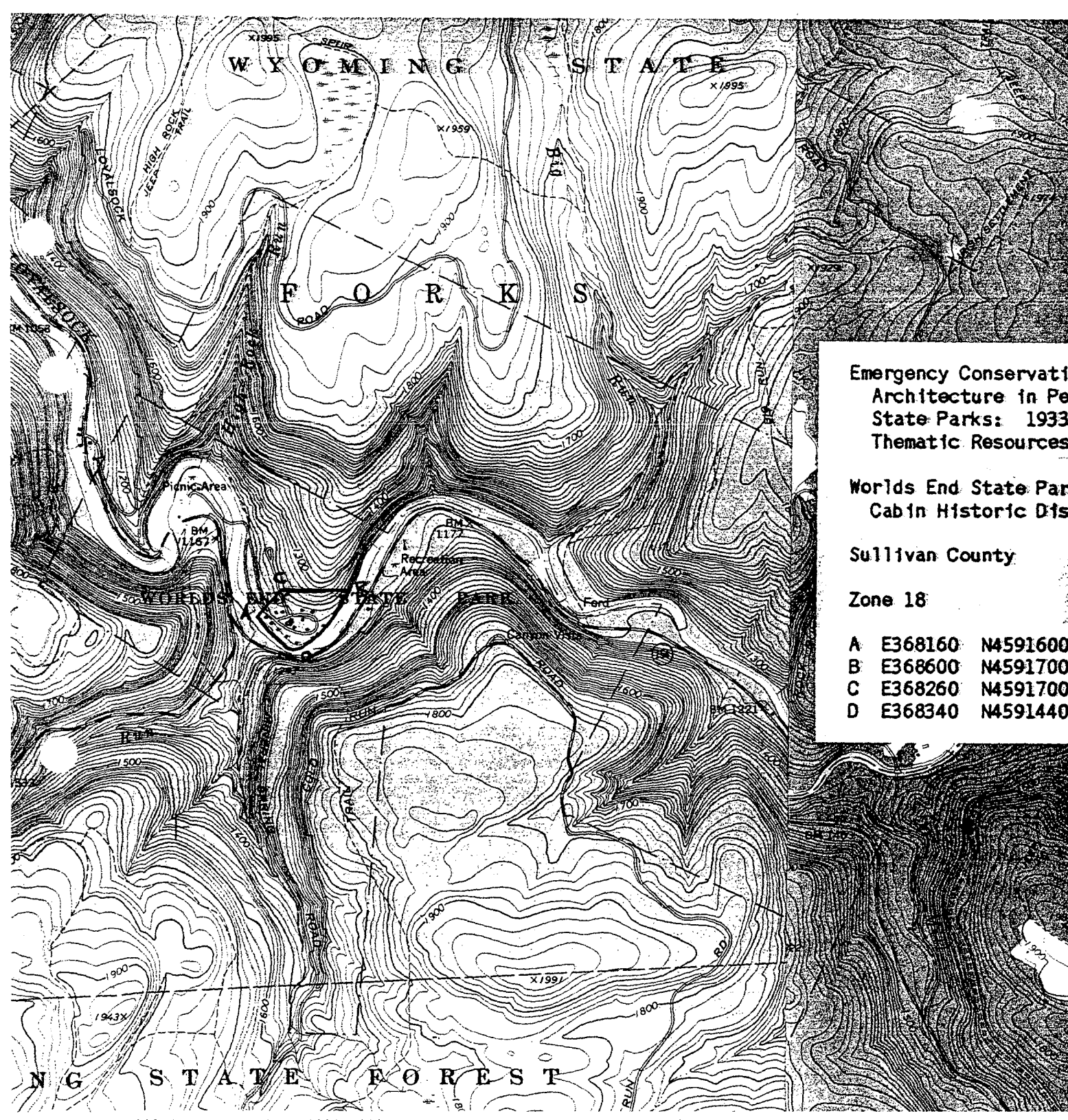
