Woodrow Wilson Junior High School

Physical Description

The Wilson School rises three stories in height and spans a width of fifteen bays, almost filling the block. Constructed of brick with limestone trim, the building has a symmetrical placement of elements and horizontal emphasis typical of Neo-Classical design. The building is defined by a center projecting frontispiece and two flanking projecting building ends. The main entrance is handsomely detailed with four smooth dressed Doric columns supporting an entablature incised with the school name. Above is a molded cornice and a balustraded parapet. The main facade of the building is broken down into elements beginning with a smooth dressed limestone basement. The first floor is defined by a smooth dressed band course above the window heads. The main body of the building is characterized by slightly projecting brick pilasters with stone bases and capitals with flank the slightly recessed window bays. These pilasters support a smooth dressed fascia with molded cornice with dentillation. Rising above the cornice is an unadorned brick parapet wall. The fenestration pattern is regular with tripartite, double hung sash with molded mullions. The original sash have been replaced with aluminum sash with paning infill.

Statement of Significance

Designed in the Neo-Classical style, the Woodrow Wilson Junior High School exemplifies an architectural style that epitomized institutional and public structures. Constructed in 1927, the school is an excellent example of the design flexibility of School Board Architect Irwin T. Catharine. Son of School Board Chairman, Joseph Catharine, he studied architecture at Drexel Institute in preparation for a careeer with the school board. Undertaking the position of Head Draftsman, in 1919, he succeeded John D. Cassell as Building Superintendent in 1930. Working within the basic constraints of standard school plan and massing, Catharine designed an impressive junior high school plant in the then popular Neo-Classical style. Commonly used for public and institutional buildings as banks, courts and museums, the building's handsome appearance could easily imply any one of the aforementioned uses.

This school is distinctive among Catharine's Neo-Classical school designs. It is not as intricately detailed as two other Neo-Classical schools designed by Catharine—the W. and E. Martin and the Julia Masterman Schools. However, like the Wagner Junior High School, the monumental scale and long, horizontal lines of the Wilson Junior High School are much more striking than the scale and lines in the Martin and Masterman Schools.

Thus the Wilson Junior High School is a distinctive Neo-Classical public school design by Catharine.
