Building and Structure Inventory:

Beaver River

Girard Locks (remains) - the upper portion of the upper lock as well as the curved river wall approaching the lock on the north remain visible on the eastern bank of the Beaver River, just south of the Bridgewater Bridge, in the Borough of Rochester; the wall of the lock, as well as the river wall, are constructed of stone; the upper lock was approximately 120 feet long and sixteen feet wide, and has been filled in and used as the foundation for the sewage pumping station of the Borough of Rochester (which is a one-story brick building from the mid-twentieth century, approximately twenty-five feet square); there is a high probability that the remains of the lower lock lie buried for approximately 120 feet south of the upper lock; together with the dam, this was built in 1834 and is a contributing structure

Beaver Extension Canal Dam Number 6 (remains) - there is a high probability that the dam portion of the dam/lock complex at the mouth of the Beaver River remains submerged in the Beaver River, just south of the Bridgewater Bridge, between the Boroughs of Bridgewater and Rochester; the dam was constructed in 1834, spanning the 450-foot-wide river in order to raise the pool level of the river in order to aid navigation; the dam was submerged in 1935 when the Montgomery Island Dam raised the level of the Ohio and Beaver Rivers at their juncture by fifteen (15) feet); together with the Girard Locks, this is a contributing structure

Bridge Street

Bridgewater-Rochester Bridge: three-span steel through truss (Parker, Pratt type) bridge, with 2 abutments (at the riverbanks) and an overall span of approximately 700 feet between the Boroughs of Bridgewater and Rochester; this bridge was built in 1933 on the site of two predecessor bridges, the second of which was damaged by fire in 1931; contributing structure

71 Bridge Street: commercial building; one-story brick structure with a mansard/pent roof, and a parking lot in front; 1970s; non-contributing (after period of significance)

110 Bridge Street (former 38-40 Bridge Street): originally a residence, now a commercial building; 2-story side-gabled building covered with aluminum siding, two-over-two-light windows on the second floor, and all exterior details stripped off; ca. 1890; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

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121 Bridge Street (former 63 Bridge Street): originally a residence, now a commercial structure; a 2-story Flemish-bond brick 5-bay center-hall building with a side-gabled roof, a round-arched central entrance, and simple wooden lintels over the windows; Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; contributing

124 Bridge Street (former 35-37 Bridge Street, northeast corner Market Street): commercial building, originally known as the Mulheim Building, with storefronts on the first floor and apartments above; 3-story brick building, 4 bays wide on Bridge Street (rest of the building demolished), with one-over-one-light windows on the second floor and six-over-six-light windows on the third floor and simple 2-course lintel over the openings; the rear wing along Market Street is a 2-story brick side-gabled structure with simple windows; vernacular Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; contributing

200-06 Bridge Street (former 32-34 Bridge Street, corner Market Street): commercial building with storefronts on the first floor and a meeting hall above; originally known as Hurst's Opera House, later Knights of Pythias Hall (by 1911 and 1925); 3-story brick building, 6 bays in width on Bridge Street, with jack arches over the windows on the second floor and segmentally-arched windows on the third floor, and a projecting wood cornice with paired brackets; along Market Street is an old storefront with a signboard and heavy bracketing (507 Market) that housed a fire engine in the early twentieth century, and very tall windows into the meeting hall above; Italianate style; ca. 1880; contributing

212 Bridge Street (former 30 Bridge Street): commercial building with a storefront on the first floor and apartments above; 2-story tapestry brick building with soldier-course lintels above paired windows on the second floor; ca. 1925; contributing

214 Bridge Street (former 29 Bridge Street): commercial building with a storefront on the first floor (post office in 1925) and apartments above; 2 1/2-story brick structure with a mansard roof, segmentally-arched windows on the second floor, and sizable brackets under the box gutter; Second Empire style; ca. 1875; contributing

222 Bridge Street (former 27 Bridge Street): residence; sometimes a commercial structure in the past; 2-story brick structure with a side-gabled roof and double chimneys on the street side; 3 bays in width, with a doorway and transom at the left, a former storefront filled in with brick on the first floor, and two-over-two-light windows on the second floor; ca. 1870; contributing

226 Bridge Street (former 26 Bridge Street): commercial building; 1-story brick building with soldier course lintels and a brick panel above the storefront; ca. 1925; contributing

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228 Bridge Street (former 25 Bridge Street): commercial building with an early (or original) storefront on the first floor and apartments on the second floor; 2-story brick structure with soldier course lintels over the windows; ca. 1925; contributing

232 Bridge Street (former 24 Bridge Street): commercial building with a storefront on the first floor and apartments on the second floor; 2-story yellow brick building with rock-faced stone lintels and sills; ca. 1895; contributing

234 Bridge Street (northeast corner Mulberry Street, former 22-23 Bridge Street): residential building with a commercial use (millinery) at the corner at the turn of the century; a 2-story side-gabled brick building, 5 bays wide on the first floor, 6 bays on the second, with a transom over the central entrance door; 2-course-high wooden lintels over the openings and brick dentils at the eaves; Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; contributing

300 Bridge Street (northwest corner Mulberry Street, former 19-21 Bridge Street): residential building with a storefront at the corner that housed a drug store in the early twentieth century; a 2-story side-gabled brick building, 5 bays wide with an altered central entry and 2-course-high wood lintels over the openings; vernacular Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; contributing

310 Bridge Street (former 18 Bridge Street): residence; a 2-story side-gabled structure with asbestos shingle siding and some original wood details; ca. 1870; contributing

314 Bridge Street (former 17 Bridge Street): residence, 2 stories in height, with a side-gabled roof and aluminum siding; no original details visible; ca. 1870; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

Bridge Street at Clarion Street (northeast corner, former 16 Bridge Street): originally and today a residence, although it was used as a print shop in the early twentieth century; a 1 1/2-story asphalt shingle-sided structure with a few visible details; ca. 1890; contributing

Bridge Street at Clarion Street (northwest corner): Xillas Oil Company; commercial; 1-story metal and concrete block building; probably mid-20th century; non-contributing (after period of significance)

401 Bridge Street: residence; 2-story frame building with aluminum siding, a side-gabled roof with a central cross-gable over the entry, and a one-story porch at the front; ca. 1900; contributing

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413 Bridge Street: originally a residence, now used as a commercial laboratory; a 2 1/2-story orange brick building with an L-shaped plan, at the inner corner of which is a rounded 3-story bay with a conical roof; the main roof is gabled over both wings of the "L", and a one-story porch is held between the wings; Queen Anne style; ca. 1900; contributing

Bridge Street: First Presbyterian Church, in continuous use since it was constructed in 1876: a 1-story brick structure with a front gable interrupted by a central tower that extends one story above the roof; stained glass window in front has anchor design; datestone reads "First Presbyterian Church built 1845 rebuilt 1876"; Romanesque Revival style; contributing

Market Street

500 Market Street: originally a bakery (Keystone Bakery), now a restaurant and office building; a complex of brick buildings, including the original 2-story building (1904), with a third-floor addition (ca. 1907), a one-story annex to the north and three-story annex to the south of the original section (1907), and a 2-story addition at the south (1911); the one-story annex at the north end has segmentally-arched windows and recessed brick panels; there is a recent (ca. 1990) one-story addition on the east (river) side of the complex, sided with synthetic stucco; contributing

515 Market Street (former 210 Market Street): residence; 2-story frame building with aluminum siding, a side-gabled roof, and a brick front porch; ca. 1900; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

599 Market Street (southwest corner Otter Lane, former 212 Market Street): originally a residence, now an office; 2-story building with a hipped roof, 3 bays wide; completely remodeled; ca. 1890; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

605 Market Street (northwest corner Otter Lane, former 213 Market Street): residence; 2-story frame building sheathed with non-historic wood shingles; windows altered; ca. 1885, altered c. 1965; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

618 Market Street (former 239 Market Street): residence; 2-story frame building, 3 bays wide, with aluminum siding; shape indicates ca. 1870; a 3-story brick wing, in the French Second Empire style with a mansard roof and dormers (ca. 1875) extends to the rear; contributing

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619 Market Street (former 216 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2- story frame structure with 3 bays across front and an offset on the left side; Queen Anne-style features, including a squared-off Palladian window in the attic and fishscale shingles in the gable; ca. 1890; contributing

624 Market Street (former 240 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story frame structure with aluminum siding and a front-facing gambrel roof; Dutch Colonial Revival style, with a front porch intact and influenced by the Arts and Crafts style; ca. 1895; contributing

627 Market Street (former 217 Market Street): residence; 1 1/2-story frame building with aluminum siding and a side-facing gambrel roof; Dutch Colonial style, with an intact front porch influenced by the Craftsman style; ca. 1905; contributing

628 Market Street (southeast corner Fulton Street): medical office building; 1-story building with vertical plywood siding and single-pane windows; ca. 1970; non-contributing (after period of significance)

699 Market Street (former 218 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story frame building with original wood siding, a hipped roof with cross gables, and a front porch with original wood columns; ca. 1905; contributing

700 Market Street (northeast corner Fulton Street, former 242 Market Street): residence; 2-story tapestry brick building with a hipped roof and a one-story porch; ca. 1915; contributing

711 Market Street (former 220 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with the corners cut at 45 degrees (in the Queen Anne style), a front-gabled roof, and aluminum siding; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

712 Market Street (former 244 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame building in an L-shaped plan with a gabled roof, insulbrick siding, and fishscale wood shingles in the gable in the Queen Anne style; a 2-story polygonal bay rises up to the gable; ca. 1895; contributing

713 Market Street (former 221 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building in an L-shaped plan with a front-gabled roof, a wrap-around front porch, and aluminum siding; ca. 1895; contributing

717 Market Street (former 267 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building in an L-shaped plan with a hipped roof (with cross gables), aluminum siding, and a one-story bay on front; ca. 1895; contributing

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721 Market Street (former 268 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building in an L-shaped plan with a front-gabled roof and aluminum siding; the windows have been altered and few details remain; ca. 1900; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

722 Market Street (former 246 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with a hipped roof, the original wood siding, and a one-story porch across the front; Foursquare house type; ca. 1910; contributing

726 Market Street (former 247 Market Street): residence; originally a twin of 727 Market, but with aluminum siding and an enclosed 1-story porch across the front; ca. 1900; contributing

727 Market Street (former 269 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with a front-gabled roof, the original wood siding, and wide 1/1 windows; ca. 1900; contributing

730 Market Street: residence; part of a row of 5 once-identical 2-story wood frame houses with front-gabled roofs; original wood windows and siding, fishscale shingles in the front gable, and a brick porch; ca. 1895; contributing

732 Market Street: residence; part of a row of 5 once-identical wood frame houses with front-gabled roofs; aluminum siding and a brick porch; ca. 1895; contributing

735 Market Street (former 270 Market Street): Borough building, originally the (first) Bridgewater Public School; 2-story brick building with a front-gabled roof, flanked by 2 one-story side-gabled wings, housing the Bridgewater Volunteer Fire Department; the first-floor openings have been altered; recesses and projections in the brickwork; Greek Revival style; 1860; contributing

736 Market Street: residence; part of a row of 5 once-identical wood frame houses with front-gabled roofs; aluminum siding and original wood columns; ca. 1895; contributing 740 Market Street: residence; part of a row of 5 once-identical wood frame houses with front-gabled roofs; aluminum siding and a brick porch; ca. 1895; contributing

742 Market Street: residence; part of a row of 5 once-identical wood frame houses with front-gabled roofs; aluminum siding and an altered porch with wood posts; ca. 1895; contributing

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798 Market Street (former 252B Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with a front-gabled roof, aluminum siding, corners cut away at a 45-degree angle (in the Queen Anne style) and a yellow-brick porch; ca. 1905; contributing

802 Market Street (former 253 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with a front-gabled roof, aluminum siding, and a wooden porch across front; ca. 1870; contributing

803 Market Street (former 271 Market Street): residence; 2-story brick building with a front-gabled roof; one opening on each floor in the front; door and window openings have simple 2-course-high wood lintels; little ornament; vernacular Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; contributing

807 Market Street (former 272 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with a side-gabled roof; altered drastically; ca. 1915; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

815 Market Street (former 274 Market Street): residence (Joseph Hemphill House); 2-story, narrow brick building with a side-gabled roof; 5 bays wide on Market Street with a central entrance (transom over entrance); 3-course stone lintels over the openings; some deterioration of the bricks; 1818; contributing

816 Market Street (former 256 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame building with a front-gabled roof and aluminum siding; details stripped off; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

819 Market Street (former 275 Market Street, southwest corner Leopard Lane): residence; 1 1/2-story wood frame building with a side-gabled roof whose front slope extends over the front porch (the posts of which are shingled); a large shed dormer with 2 pairs of windows rises from the front slope of the roof; aluminum siding on walls; Craftsman bungalow; ca. 1920; contributing

898 Market Street (former 257 Market Street, southeast corner Leopard Lane): residence; 2-story L-shaped wood frame building with cross-gabled roof, with fishscale shingles in the front gable and a 1-story polygonal bay at the side gable; wood siding, wood columns on wrap-around porch, and a small tower with a high pyramidal roof (in the elbow of the L); free-classical version of the Queen Anne Style; ca. 1895; contributing

900 Market Street (former 258 Market Street, northeast corner Leopard Lane): Bridgewater United Methodist Church; yellow brick structure, L-shaped in plan with gabled roofs over the two wings of the L, and large arched windows in the gables; in the L is a 3-story tower with a Classical pedimented entrance (with Scamozzi

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Ionic columns) and wall dormers and small gabled projections at the top; Classical Revival style; 1907 (datestone reads "Methodist Episcopal Church 1839 1907"); contributing

907 Market Street (former 276 Market Street, northwest corner Leopard Lane): residence; 2-story wood frame structure sheathed in aluminum siding, L-shaped in plan; in the L is a 2-story element with a low hipped roof; Queen Anne style; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

908 Market Street (former 259 Market Street): residence adjoining church and attached to it; 2 1/2-story 3-bay center-hall side-gabled structure built of yellow brick with a front porch (not full width) that has Doric columns and a large 2-window pedimented dormer in the center of the front slope of the roof; Colonial Revival style; 1907; contributing

909 Market Street: residence; 2-story structure with a side-gabled roof, covered with permastone & aluminum siding; ca. 1955; non-contributing (after period of significance)

911 Market Street (former 278 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with a pyramidal hipped roof and aluminum siding; brick front porch enclosed with plywood; Foursquare type of house; ca. 1905; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

915 Market Street (former 279 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with a gabled roof and a Craftsman-influenced front porch; original wood siding and fishscale shingles in the front-facing gable still remain; ca. 1905; contributing

918 Market Street (former 260 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story wood-frame structure with a front-gabled roof and aluminum siding; ca. 1895; contributing

927 Market Street (north of alley): residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with aluminum siding and an enclosed front porch; Foursquare house type with generic Craftsman details; ca. 1920; contributing

929 Market Street (former 281 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a front-gabled roof, aluminum siding, and a wood front porch; a permastone vestibule was built in the porch; ca. 1900; contributing

998 Market Street (former 264 Market Street, southeast corner Canal Street): residence; 2-story wood frame structure, 5 bays wide, with asbestos shingles; few details remain, including generic early twentieth century porch over the entry; ca. 1890; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

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999 Market Street (former 282 Market Street): residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with a front-gabled roof and aluminum siding; details have been stripped off; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1000 Market Street (former 265 Market Street, northeast corner Canal Street): residence; small 2-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof and aluminum siding; Colonial Revival detailing; ca. 1900; contributing

1001 Market Street (northwest corner Canal Street): formerly West Bridgewater Public School (second public school in borough); now apartments; 2-story orange brick building with a flat roof and a stone Tudor-arched entryway in the center of the front facade; soldier course ornamentation in the brickwork; window openings have been closed in for small metal windows; small war memorial in the front yard; 1915; contributing

1004 Market Street (former 267 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof and a cross gable in the center; horizontal beaded board siding and fishscale shingles; polygonal projecting bays flank a polygonal front porch; beautifully restored; Queen Anne style; ca. 1895; contributing

1012 Market Street (former 268 Market Street): residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof and aluminum siding; narrow plan; front porch with turned posts; ca. 1895; contributing

1016 Market Street: residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof, aluminum siding, doubled windows on the second floor, and a brick porch across the front facade; Foursquare house type; 1925; contributing

1019 Market Street: residence; a 2 1/2-story hipped-roof frame structure with a large gabled front roof dormer, aluminum siding, and the original one-story wood porch across the front; Foursquare house type; ca. 1910; contributing

1020 Market Street: residence; a 2 1/2-story hipped-roof frame building with a large gabled front roof dormer, aluminum siding, and a one-story porch across the front; Foursquare house type; ca. 1910; contributing

1025 Market Street: residence; 2-story brick building with a hipped roof (and a large hipped front dormer), doubled windows, and an enclosed 1-story brick porch; Foursquare house type with Colonial Revival details; house built on a rise; ca. 1910; contributing

1096 Market Street: residence; a 2 1/2-story hipped-roof frame structure with a large front roof dormer, aluminum siding, and a one-story porch across the front; Foursquare house type; ca. 1910; contributing

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1098 Market Street: residence; a 2 1/2-story hipped-roof brick structure with a 1-story front porch; Foursquare house type; ca. 1910; contributing

1099 Market Street (southwest corner of Market and Washington Streets): residence; 1 1/2-story frame structure with a side-gabled roof and a cross-gable over the central entry, with a 1-story enclosed front porch; aluminum siding; Colonial Revival details; ca. 1920; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1100 Market Street (northeast corner of Market and Washington Streets): residence; 2-story frame structure with a side-gabled roof and a 1-story porch across the front; resided with vertical redwood siding; late nineteenth century; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1101 Market Street (northwest corner of Market and Washington Streets): residence; 2 1/2-story frame structure with a hipped roof and cross gables and aluminum siding, built on a rise; originally Queen Anne in style, but the details have been stripped off; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1111 Market Street: residence; 2 1/2-story frame building with a hipped roof, aluminum siding, and a 1-story front porch with original wood columns; Foursquare house type with Colonial Revival details; ca. 1910; contributing

1116 Market Street: residence; 2-story frame structure with a side-gabled roof, aluminum siding, and a Colonialized entry; ca. 1910; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1118 Market Street: residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof and original wood siding; Classical porch; ca. 1900; contributing

1121 Market Street: residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof and cross gables; permastone and asbestos shingle siding; originally Queen Anne style; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1198 Market Street: residence; 2 1/2-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof; asbestos shingle siding; Queen Anne style; ca. 1895; contributing

1200 Market Street: residence; 1-story wood frame structure with aluminum siding; ca. 1960; non-contributing (after period of significance)

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1201 Market Street (northwest corner of Market Street and Lion Lane): residence; 2 1/2-story frame building with a hipped roof and cross gables, intact wood siding and trim, and bays with beveled corners; the one-story porch has the original doubled Classical columns; free classic variant of the Queen Anne style; ca. 1895; contributing

1207 Market Street: residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof; 2 bays in width; wood siding and two-over-two-light windows; Italianate style; ca. 1875; contributing

1212 Market Street: residence; 1-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof; wood siding; non-stylistic; non-contributing (after period of significance)

1213 Market Street: residence; 1 1/2-story frame structure with a side-gabled roof, which extends to the south over an enclosed side porch, and aluminum siding; bungalow house type; 1920s; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1217 Market Street: residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a hipped roof; aluminum siding and a brick front porch; Foursquare house type; ca. 1910; contributing

1298 Market Street (former 282 Market Street, southeast corner Poplar Street): William Dunlap Mansion; residence; 1 1/2-story Greek Revival house with a temple-like front portico; constructed ca. 1840 for James Arbuckle; listed in the National Register of Historic Places; contributing but not counted in resource totals

1299 Market Street: residence; 1-story wood frame structure with side-gabled roof; aluminum siding; ranch style house with integral garage; ca. 1955; non-contributing (after period of significance)

1300 Market Street (former 283 Market Street, northeast corner Poplar Street): residence; 2-story Flemish-bond brick structure with a side-gabled roof; 5 bays in width, with the entrance at the far left behind a brick porch; openings have 2-course-high wood lintels; the porch and the colonialized front door have been altered; Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; contributing

Market Street and Poplar Street (northwest corner, former 302 Market Street): Small House; residence; 2-story brick structure with a side-gabled roof; 5 bays in width, with a center-hall entry door with sidelights and transom; all openings have 2-course-high wood lintels, and the windows are six-over-six-light double-hung; Greek Revival style; ca. 1845; contributing

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1300 block of Market Street (unnumbered, second building on the west side): residences; 2-story brick triple rowhouses with a side-gabled roof; details have been altered; vernacular Greek Revival style; ca. 1850; three (3) contributing resources

1312 Market Street: residence; 2-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof; 5 bays in width; sided with wood shingles; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

1314 Market Street: residence; one-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof; aluminum siding; ca. 1955; non-contributing (after period of significance)

1316 Market Street: residence; one-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof; aluminum siding; ca. 1955; non-contributing (after period of significance)

1318 Market Street: residence; one-story wood frame structure with a side-gabled roof; aluminum siding; ca. 1955; non-contributing (after period of significance)

Leopard Lane (behind the Presbyterian Church): residence; 2-1/2-story frame building with a front-gabled roof, aluminum siding, and a 1-story front porch; details stripped off; ca. 1895; non-contributing (loss of integrity)

Mulberry Street

514 Mulberry Street: residence; a narrow 2-story frame structure with a front-gabled roof, wood siding, and a 1-story front porch with ornamental iron supports; ca. 1905; contributing

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Mulberry Street (500 block, second house on the east side): residence; a narrow (2 bays wide) 2-story frame building with a front-gabled roof, wood siding, and a 1-story front porch with the original turned wood posts; late nineteenth century; contributing

599 Mulberry Street: residence; 2-story frame building with a front-gabled roof and wood siding; 2 bays wide with a semi-octagonal 1-story bay at the front; a second-story addition on posts was constructed in the recent past; Italianate style; ca. 1875; contributing

600 Mulberry Street: residence; 2-story frame structure with a side-gabled roof, aluminum siding, and altered windows; trim stripped off; ca. 1890; non-contributing (loss of integrity)
